## Undergraduate Problems

Choose one problem from 1-2 and one from 3-4. Please show all work. Unsupported claims will not receive credit.

1. Describe a function $f:(0,1) \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ that is continuous but not uniformly continuous. Prove that it has these properties.
2. Suppose that $f:[0,1] \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ has a continuous derivative $f^{\prime}$. Prove that $f$ is uniformly continuous.
3. State the definition of continuity. Then show by definition that $f(x)=x^{2}+x+2$ is continuous on $\mathbb{R}$.
4. Prove the series $\sum_{i=1}^{\infty}(-1)^{i} a_{i}$ is convergent, where the numbers $a_{i}>0$ decrease to 0 as $i \rightarrow \infty$.

Choose one problem from 1-2 and one from 3-4. Please show all work. Unsupported claims will not receive credit. In this part, $\mathbb{R}$ is equipped with Lebesgue measurable sets and the Lebesgue measure.

1. State the definition that a set in $\mathbb{R}$ is measurable. Use the definition to prove that the set of irrational numbers in $[0,1]$ is measurable.
2. State the definition that a function from $\mathbb{R}$ to $\mathbb{R}$ is measurable. Let $f_{n}, n \in\{1,2,3, \ldots\}$, be measureable and prove that $f=\sup _{n} f_{n}(x)$ is also measurable. Is the conclusion still true if the index set $\{1,2,3, \ldots\}$ is replaced by the interval $[0,1]$. Why?
3. Suppose $f_{n}, f \in L^{1}[0,1]$ and $f_{n} \rightarrow f$ a.e.
(a). Show by examples that even if $\lim _{n} \int_{0}^{1} f_{n}$ exists, it may not equal $\int_{0}^{1} f$.
(b). Prove that $\int_{0}^{1}\left|f_{n}-f\right| \rightarrow 0$ if and only if $\int\left|f_{n}\right| \rightarrow \int|f|$.
4. Compute the following limit and justify the calculation

$$
\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \int_{0}^{1}\left(1+n x^{2}\right)(1+x)^{-n} d x
$$

Choose one problem from 1-2 and one from 3-4. Please show all work. Unsupported claims will not receive credit. In this part, $m$ denotes the Lebesgue measure.

1. State the complex measure version of the Lebesgue-Radon-Nikodym (LRN) Theorem. Then construct a measurable space $(\mathbb{X}, \mathcal{M})$ with two positivite measures $\nu$ and $\lambda$ such that $\nu \ll \lambda$ but $d \nu \neq f d \lambda$ for any $f$. Show all your steps and explain why LRN fails for your example.
2. State the Lebesgue differetiation theorem. Then use it to prove the following result. Let $E \subset \mathbb{R}^{n}$ be a Borel set. Then for $m$-a.e. $x \in E$, it holds that

$$
\lim _{r \rightarrow 0} \frac{m(E \cap B(r, x))}{m(B(r, x))}=1 .
$$

Note here $B(r, x)=\left\{y \in \mathbb{R}^{n}:\|x-y\|<r\right\}$ where $\|\cdot\|$ is the standard distance in $\mathbb{R}^{n}$.
3. State and prove the Baire category theorem.
4. State and prove the Riemann Lebesgue lemma for functions defined on $\mathbb{T}=\mathbb{R} / \mathbb{Z}$. Here you may use the Stone-Weierstrass theorem and the fact that $C(\mathbb{T})$ is densed in $\left(L^{1}(\mathbb{T}, m),\|\cdot\|_{1}\right)$.

Choose one problem from 1-2 and one from 3-4. Please show all work. Unsupported claims will not receive credit. In this part, $\mathbb{R}$ is equipped with Lebesgue measurable sets and the Lebesgue measure.

1. If $f \in L^{p} \cap L^{\infty}$ for some $p<\infty$ and $f \in L^{q}$ for all $q>p$, then

$$
\|f\|_{\infty}=\lim _{q \rightarrow \infty}\|f\|_{q}
$$

2. State and prove Holder's inequality for Lebesgue measurable functions on $\mathbb{R}$.
3. Let $f$ be a smooth function on $\mathbb{R}$ with compact support. Show that if the Fourier transform of $f$ also has compact support, then $f=0$.
4. Show that any normed vector space can be embedded into a Banach space.

## Undergraduate Problems

Choose one problem from 1-2 and one from 3-4. Please show all work. Unsupported claims will not receive credit.

1. Suppose that $f(x)$ has continuous first derivative on $[0,2 \pi]$. Show that

$$
\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \int_{0}^{2 \pi} f(x) \sin (n x) d x=0
$$

2. Let $f(x):[0,1] \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ be the function so that

$$
f(x)=\left\{\begin{array}{ll}
1, & x \in \mathbb{Q} \\
2, & x \notin \mathbb{Q}
\end{array} .\right.
$$

Prove using definition of Riemann integral that $f$ is not Riemann integrable on $[0,1]$.
3. Prove from definition that the function $f(x)=0, x \leq 0 ; f(x)=e^{-2 / x}, x>0$ is differentiable at $x=0$ and $f^{\prime}(0)=0$.
4. Prove using $\epsilon-\delta$ deifnition of continuity that $f(x)=\sqrt{x}$ is continuous on $[0, \infty)$.

Choose one problem from 1-2 and one from 3-4. Please show all work. Unsupported claims will not receive credit.

1. Let $(\mathbb{X}, \mathcal{M}, \mu)$ be a measure space. Let $\mathcal{N}=\{N \in \mathcal{M}: \mu(N)=0\}$ and

$$
\overline{\mathcal{M}}=\{E \cup F: E \in \mathcal{M} \text { and } F \subset N \text { for some } N \in \mathcal{N}\} .
$$

(a) Show that $\overline{\mathcal{M}}$ is a $\sigma$-algebra.
(b) Show that there is a unique extension $\bar{\mu}$ of $\mu$ to a complete measure on $\overline{\mathcal{M}}$.
2. Let $(\mathbb{X}, \mathcal{M})$ be a measurable space and let $\mu: \mathcal{M} \rightarrow[0, \infty]$ be finite additive and $\mu(\varnothing)=0$. Show that $\mu$ is a measure on $(\mathbb{X}, \mathcal{M})$ if and only if it is continuous from below. Recall that we say $\mu$ is continuous from below if $\left\{E_{j}\right\}_{1}^{\infty} \subset \mathcal{M}$ and $E_{j} \subset E_{j+1}$ for all $j \geq 1$, then $\mu\left(\cup_{1}^{\infty} E_{j}\right)=\lim _{j \rightarrow \infty} \mu\left(E_{j}\right)$.
3. State Fatou's lemma and Lebesgue dominated convergence theorem. Then use Fatou's lemma to prove the Lebesgue dominated convergence theorem.
4. Consider the measurable spaces $\mathbb{X}=\mathbb{Y}=[0,1]$ and let $\mathcal{M}=\mathcal{N}=\mathcal{B}_{[0,1]}$ be the Borel- $\sigma$ algebra on $[0,1]$. Let $m$ be the Lebesuge measure and $\nu$ be the counting measure on $[0,1]$. Consider the product space ( $\mathbb{X} \times \mathbb{Y}, \mathcal{M} \otimes \mathcal{N}, \mu \times \nu$ ). Show that the Fubini-Tonelli therorem fails for the product space by constructing an explicit measurable function $f$ on $\mathbb{X} \times \mathbb{Y}$ where the two iterated integrals are not equal. You have to show all the necessary steps of your computation. Explain why Fubini-Tonelli theorem doesn't work in this context.

Choose one problem from 1-2 and one from 3-4. Please show all work. Unsupported claims will not receive credit.

1. State without proof a version of the Lebesgue-Radon-Nikodym theorem. Let $m$ be the Lebesgue measure on $[0,1]$ and $\nu$ be the counting measure on $[0,1]$. Show that $\nu$ does not have a Lebesgue decomposition with respect to $m$.
2. State the definition that a function on $\mathbb{R}^{1}$ is absolutely continuous. Prove that an absolutely continuous function on $\mathbb{R}^{1}$ whose derivative is 0 a.e. must be a constant.
3. State the closed graph theorem. Let $Y=C[0,1]$ be the space of continuous functions on $[0,1]$ and $X=C^{1}[0,1]$ the space of $C^{1}$ functions on $[0,1]$, both equipped with the sup norm $\|\cdot\|_{\infty}$. Show that the differentiation map $d / d x$ from $X$ to $Y$ is closed but not bounded.
4. Construct a sequence of functions on $L^{2}[0,1]$ which converges to the constant 1 weakly but not to 1 strongly. You may assume the Riemann Lebesgue lemma.

Choose one problem from 1-2 and one from 3-4. Please show all work. Unsupported claims will not receive credit.

1. Show that the dual space of $L^{\infty}[0,1]$ strictly contains $L^{1}[0,1]$.
2. Show that every closed convex set in a Hilbert space contains a unique element of minimal norm.
3. Use function $f(x)=\frac{1}{2}-x$ and Fourier series to show that $\sum_{n \geq 1} \frac{1}{n^{2}}=\frac{\pi^{2}}{6}$.
4. Suppose $f \in L^{2}(\mathbb{R})$. Show that the $L^{2}$ derivative $f^{\prime}$ exists iff $\xi \widehat{f} \in L^{2}$, in which case $\widehat{f}^{\prime}(\xi)=2 \pi i \xi \widehat{f}(\xi)$.

## Undergraduate Problems

Choose one problem from 1-2 and one from 3-4. Please show all work. Unsupported claims will not receive credit.

1. Prove using the $\epsilon-\delta$ definition of continuity that $f(x)=x^{2}$ is continuous on $\mathbb{R}$.
2. Prove that if $f: \mathbb{R} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ is differentiable at $x_{0}$ and $f\left(x_{0}\right)>0$ then $g=\sqrt{f}$ is differentiable at $x_{0}$ as well. Note $g$ is well defined near $x_{0}$. Do this using only the definition of the derivative. (Don't use the product rule, the chain rule, etc., unles you prove these.)
3. Use integration by parts to show that $\int_{0}^{1} \frac{f^{2}(x)}{x^{2}} d x \leq 4 \int_{0}^{1}\left(f^{\prime}(x)\right)^{2} d x$ for all smooth $f$ on $[0,1]$ such that $f(0)=0$.
4. Suppose that $f: \mathbb{R} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ is differentiable with $\left|f^{\prime}(x)\right| \leq M$ for all $x \in \mathbb{R}$, where $M$ is some positive real number. Prove that

$$
|f(x)-f(y)| \leq M|x-y| \text { for all } x, y \in \mathbb{R} .
$$

Choose one problem from 1-2 and one from 3-4. Please show all work. Unsupported claims will not receive credit.

1. Given a measure space $(X, \mathcal{M}, \mu)$ and $E \in \mathcal{M}$, define $\mu_{E}(A)=\mu(A \cap E)$ for all $A \in \mathcal{M}$. Prove that $\mu_{E}$ is a measure; that is, $\left(X, \mathcal{M}, \mu_{E}\right)$ is a measure space.
2. If $f: \mathbb{R} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ is monotone then it is Borel measurable.
3. Given a measure space $(X, \mathcal{M}, \mu)$, let $f \in L^{+}(\mathcal{M}) .{ }^{1}$ Define $\lambda(E):=\int_{E} f d \mu$ for all $E \in \mathcal{M}$. Prove that $\lambda$ is a measure on $\mathcal{M}$ and that for all $g \in L^{+}$,

$$
\int g d \lambda=\int f g d \mu .
$$

4. Let $(X, \mathcal{M}, \mu)$ be a measure space. If $\mu\left(E_{n}\right)<\infty$ for all $n \in \mathbb{N}$ and $\mathbb{1}_{E_{n}} \rightarrow f$ in $L^{1}(\mathcal{M})$ as $n \rightarrow \infty$, then $f$ is (almost everywhere) equal to the characteristic function of a measurable set. ${ }^{2}$
[^0]Choose one problem from 1-2 and one from 3-4. Please show all work. Unsupported claims will not receive credit.

1. Let

$$
g(x)=\left\{\begin{array}{l}
e^{x}-1, \quad x<0 \\
e^{x}, \quad 0 \leq x<1 \\
x+3, \quad x \geq 1
\end{array}\right.
$$

Let $\nu$ be the Borel measure generated by $g$, i.e. $\nu((a, b])=g(b)-g(a)$ for all numbers $b \geq a$. Let $\nu=\lambda+f d \mu$ be the Lebesque decomposition, where $\mu$ is the Lebsgue measure and $\lambda$ is singular w.r.t. $\mu$. Determine $\lambda$ and $f$ explicitly.
2. State respectively the definitions that a function is of bounded variation and absolutely continuous on $[0,1]$. Construct a continuous function on $[0,1]$ which is of bounded variation but is not absolutely continuous.
3. Let $X=[0,2 \pi]$, equipped with Lebesgue measure. (a). Let $f_{n}=\sin ^{21}(n x)$. Prove that $f_{n}$ converges to 0 weakly in $L^{2}(X)$ as $n \rightarrow \infty$. That is, $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty}\left\langle g, f_{n}\right\rangle=0$ for all $g \in L^{2}(X)$ where $\langle\cdot, \cdot\rangle$ is the inner product on $L^{2}(X)$. You may assume Riemann-Lebesgue Lemma. (b). Prove that $f_{n}$ does not converge to 0 a.e.
4. Let $[0,1]$ be equipped with the Lebesgue measure. Let $L^{1}[0,1]$ be the space of integrable functions and $L^{p}[0,1], p>1$, be the space of functions whose $p$-th power is integrable on $[0,1]$. Show that $L^{p}[0,1]$ is a meager subset of $L^{1}[0,1]$, i.e., $L^{p}[0,1]$ can be written as a countable union of nowhere dense subsets of $L^{1}[0,1]$. Hint: $L^{p}[0,1]=\bigcup_{N=1}^{\infty}\left\{f:\|f\|_{p} \leq N\right\}$.

Choose one problem from 1-2 and one from 3-4. Please show all work. Unsupported claims will not receive credit.

1. Let $m$ be Lebesgue measure on the unit circle $\mathbb{T}=\mathbb{R} / \mathbb{Z}$. Consider the space $\left(L^{\infty}(\mathbb{T}, m),\|\cdot\|_{L^{1}}\right)$ where $\|f\|_{L^{1}}=\int_{\mathbb{T}}|f| d m$.
(a) Is it a Banach space? Prove your answer.
(b) Is it a separable space? Prove you answer. Here you may use the fact that trigonometric polynomials are dense in $\left(L^{p}(\mathbb{T}, m),\|\cdot\|_{L^{p}}\right)$ for $1 \leq p<\infty$.
2. Let $(X, \mathcal{M}, \mu)$ be measure space where $\mu$ is a positive measure. Let $\left\{f_{n}\right\}_{n \geq 1}$ be a Cauchy sequence in $\left(L^{1}(X, \mu),\|\cdot\|_{L^{1}}\right)$. Find a subsequence $\left\{f_{n_{k}}\right\}_{k \geq 1}$ of $\left\{f_{n}\right\}$ such that the pointwise limit

$$
f(x):=\lim _{k \rightarrow \infty} f_{n_{k}}(x)
$$

exists for $\mu$-almost every $x \in X$ and $f \in L^{1}(X, \mu)$.
3. Recall the Schwartz space $\mathcal{S}(\mathbb{R})$ is a Fréchet space via the family of semi-norms

$$
\|f\|_{k}:=\sum_{n, m:|n|+|m| \leq k} \sup _{x \in \mathbb{R}}\left|x^{n} f^{(m)}(x)\right| .
$$

Consider the linear map $\Lambda: \mathcal{S}(\mathbb{R}) \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ where $\Lambda(f)=\int_{\mathbb{R}}|x f| d x$. Show that $\Lambda$ is continuous with respect to the natural topology on $\mathcal{S}(\mathbb{R})$.
4. Recall the Fourier Transformation on $\mathcal{S}(\mathbb{R})$ is defined as

$$
\hat{f}(\xi):=(2 \pi)^{-\frac{1}{2}} \int_{\mathbb{R}} f(x) e^{-i x \xi} d x
$$

Show that $\hat{f} \in C^{\infty}(\mathbb{R})$ for each $f \in \mathcal{S}(\mathbb{R})$.

## Undergraduate Problems

Choose one problem from 1-2 and one from 3-4. Please show all work. Unsupported claims will not receive credit.

1. Prove that if $f: \mathbb{R} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ is differentiable then so is $f^{2}$. Do this using only the definition of the derivative. (Don't use the product rule, the chain rule, etc., unles you prove these.)
2. Let $f: \mathbb{R} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ and $g: \mathbb{R} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ be continuous functions. Show using the $\epsilon-\delta$ definition of continuity that the composite $f \circ g: \mathbb{R} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ is continuous.
3. Prove or disprove this statement: if $f_{n}:[0,1] \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ is a sequence of continuous functions and $f_{n}$ converges uniformly to $f:[0,1] \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$, then

$$
\int_{0}^{1} f_{n} d x \rightarrow \int_{0}^{1} f d x
$$

4. Prove or disprove this statement: if $f: \mathbb{R} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ is uniformly continuous, then $f^{2}$ is uniformly continuous.

Choose one problem from 1-2 and one from 3-4. Please show all work. Unsupported claims will not receive credit. The notion of measure or measurable is in the sense of Lebesgue, unless stated otherwise.

1. Suppose $f_{n}, f \in L^{1}[0,1]$. Show that if $f_{n} \rightarrow f$ in measure then

$$
\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \int_{0}^{1} \frac{\left|f_{n}-f\right|}{1+\left|f_{n}-f\right|} d x \rightarrow 0
$$

2. Rigorously compute the limit

$$
\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \int_{0}^{1} \frac{n x^{n-1}}{1+x} d x
$$

3. State and prove Hölder's inequality assuming Young's inequality, which says

$$
a b \leq \frac{a^{p}}{p}+\frac{b^{q}}{q}
$$

if $\frac{1}{p}+\frac{1}{q}=1, p, q>1$ and $a, b \geq 0$.
4. Let $f$ be a bounded measurable function and $g$ be an integrable function on $\mathbb{R}$. Prove that

$$
\lim _{h \rightarrow 0} \int_{-\infty}^{\infty} f(x)(g(x+h)-g(x)) d x=0 .
$$

Choose one problem from 1-2 and one from 3-4. Please show all work. Unsupported claims will not receive credit.

1. Find a sequence of measurable functions $f_{n}: \mathbb{R} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ such that such that

$$
\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \int_{\mathbb{R}}\left|f_{n}(x)\right| d x=+\infty
$$

and

$$
\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \int_{\mathbb{R}}\left|f_{n}(x)\right|^{2} d x=0
$$

even though both integrals are finite for all $n$. Prove the sequence has all these properties.
2. Give a function $f:[0,1] \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ that is differentiable at every point (including endpoints, where we use the one-sided derivative) but is not of bounded variation. Prove that it has these properties.
3. Find numbers $a_{i j} \in \mathbb{R}$ for $i, j=1,2,3, \ldots$ such that

$$
\sum_{i=1}^{\infty} \sum_{j=1}^{\infty} a_{i j}=1
$$

but

$$
\sum_{j=1}^{\infty} \sum_{i=1}^{\infty} a_{i j}=2
$$

Prove that all the sums involved actually converge.
4. Prove that there is no metric on the set of rational numbers that gives $\mathbb{Q}$ its usual topology but makes $\mathbb{Q}$ into a complete metric space. (The "usual topology" on $\mathbb{Q}$ is its topology as a subspace of $\mathbb{R}$.)

Choose one problem from 1-2 and one from 3-4. Please show all work. Unsupported claims will not receive credit. In what follows $m$ denotes the Lebesgue measure and $\mathbb{H}$ denotes a Hilbert space.

1. Prove the following version of Riemann-Lebesgue Lemma. Let $\mathbb{T}=\mathbb{R} / \mathbb{Z}$. Show that the Fourier coefficients $\hat{f}: \mathbb{Z} \rightarrow \mathbb{C}$ of $f \in L^{1}(\mathbb{T}, m), \hat{f}(n)=\int_{\mathbb{T}} f(x) e^{-2 n \pi i x} d x$, satisfy

$$
\lim _{|n| \rightarrow \infty}|\hat{f}(n)|=0
$$

You may use the fact that trigometric polynomials are dense in $\left(L^{1}(\mathbb{T}, m),\|\cdot\|_{1}\right)$.
2. Let

$$
\hat{f}(\xi):=(2 \pi)^{-\frac{1}{2}} \int_{\mathbb{R}} f(x) e^{-i x \xi} d x
$$

(a) State the definition of a Fréchet space.
(b) Describe the Schwartz space $\mathcal{S}(\mathbb{R})$ as a Fréchet space.
(c) Show that $\hat{f} \in C^{1}(\mathbb{R})$ for all $f \in \mathcal{S}(\mathbb{R})$. Note that you need to rigorously justify your steps.
3. Let $M$ be a closed subspace of a Hilbert space $\mathbb{H}$. For each $x \in \mathbb{H}$, let $P(x)$ be the closest point to $x$ in $M$.
(a) Show that $P: \mathbb{H} \rightarrow M$ is well-defined and is a bounded linear operator.
(b) Compute its operator norm.
4. Let $L: \mathbb{H} \rightarrow \mathbb{C}$ be a bounded linear functional that is not identically zero. Show that

$$
\operatorname{ker}(L):=\{x \in \mathbb{H}: L(x)=0\}
$$

is subspace of $\mathbb{H}$ that has codimension one. That is, you need to find a subspace $M \subset \mathbb{H}$ such that $\operatorname{dim}(M)=1$ and $\mathbb{H}=\operatorname{ker}(L) \oplus M$.

## Undergraduate Problems

Choose one problem from 1-2 and one problem from 3-4. Please show all work. Unsupported claims will not receive credit.

1. Find a function $f: \mathbb{R} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ that is differentiable everywhere but whose derivative is not continuous everywhere. Prove it has both these properties.
2. Find a function $f: \mathbb{R} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ that is continuous at all irrational numbers and discontinuous at all rational numbers. Prove it has both these properties.
3. Prove straight from the definition of Riemann integral that this function $f:[0,1] \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ is Riemann integrable:

$$
f(x)=\left\{\begin{array}{ccc}
0 & \text { if } & x \leq 1 / 2 \\
1 & \text { if } & x>1 / 2
\end{array}\right.
$$

4. Prove straight from the definition of Riemann integral that this function $f:[0,1] \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ is not Riemann integrable:

$$
f(x)=\left\{\begin{array}{lll}
0 & \text { if } & x \in \mathbb{Q} \\
1 & \text { if } & x \notin \mathbb{Q}
\end{array}\right.
$$

Choose one problem from 1-2, one from 3-4 and one from 5-6. Please show all work. Unsupported claims will not receive credit. The notion of measure or measurable is in the sense of Lebesgue, unless stated otherwise.

1. State the definition that a set in $\mathbb{R}$ is Lebesgue measurable. Prove that every countable set in $\mathbb{R}$ is Lebesgue measurable.
2. Prove that every set $S \subseteq \mathbb{R}$ with positive outer measure contains a nonmeasurable set.
3. Construct a bounded open set $O \subset \mathbb{R}$ such that the measure of $O$ is strictly less than the measure of its closure $\bar{O}$.
4. Let $\left\{f_{n}\right\}$ be a sequence of measurable functions on $[0,1]$. Prove that the set of points $x \in[0,1]$ where $f_{n}(x)$ does not converge is measurable.
5. Let $f: \mathbb{R} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ be a measurable function. Prove that $|f|$ is also measurable. Is the converse true? Why?
6. State Egoroff's Theorem. Use it to prove the Dominated Convergence Theorem for measurable functions on the interval $[0,1]$ with Lebesgue measure.

4. Using the fact stated in Problem 3, prove that if $f \in L^{1}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$ then its Fourier transform $\widehat{f}$ is continuous and approaches zero at infinity.
5. Prove that there is a tempered distribution $T \in \mathcal{S}(\mathbb{R})^{*}$ given by

$$
T(f)=\lim _{\epsilon \downarrow 0} \int_{\mathbb{R}-[-\epsilon, \epsilon]} \frac{f(x)}{x} d x
$$

[Advice: It may help to show that $T(f)=\lim _{\epsilon \downarrow 0} \int_{\epsilon}^{+\infty} \frac{f(x)-f(-x)}{x} d x$.]

(1) Prove or disprove this statement: if $f_{n}: \mathbb{R} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ is a sequence of continuous functions and $f_{n} \rightarrow f$ uniformly, then $f$ is continuous.
(2) Prove or disprove this statement: if $f, g: \mathbb{R} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ are continuous, then their product $f g$ is continuous.
(3) Prove or disprove this statement: there is a $\sigma$-algebra $\overline{\mathcal{M}}$ containing $\mathcal{M}$ and a complete measure $\bar{\mu}$ extending $\mu$.
(4) A collection $\mathcal{A}$ of subsets of $X$ is closed under countable increasing unions if whenever $A_{i} \in \mathcal{A}$ is a sequence of sets with $A_{i} \subseteq A_{i+1}$, then $\bigcup_{i=1}^{\infty} A_{i} \in \mathcal{A}$. Prove or disprove this statement: if $\mathcal{A}$ is an algebra closed under countable increasing unions, then $\mathcal{A}$ is a $\sigma$-algebra.
(5) A sequence of measurable functions $f_{n}: X \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ converges to zero in measure if for any $\epsilon>0$,

$$
\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \mu\left(\left\{x \in X:\left|f_{n}(x)\right|>\epsilon\right\}\right)=0
$$

Prove that if $f_{n}$ converges to zero in measure then

$$
\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \int_{X} \frac{f_{n}}{1+\left|f_{n}\right|} d \mu=0
$$

(6) Prove or disprove this statement: if the functions $f_{n}:[0,1] \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ are continuous and for every $x \in[0,1]$ we have $\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} f_{n}(x)=0$, then

$$
\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \int_{0}^{1} f_{n}(x) d x=0
$$

Solve 3 out of the 5 problems below.
(1) State the Hölder and Minkowski inequalities. Use the former to prove the later.
(2) Let $f \in L^{1}\left(\mathbf{R}^{n}\right)$ and let

$$
M(f)=\sup _{r>0} \frac{1}{|B(x, r)|} \int_{B(x, r)}|f(y)| d y
$$

where $B(x, r)$ is the ball of radius $r$ centered at $x$. Prove that there exists a constant $C>0$ such that for all $\alpha>0$ :

$$
|\{x: M f(x)>\alpha\}| \leq \frac{C}{\alpha} \int|f(y)| d y
$$

You may use this fact: Let $C$ be a collection of open balls in $\mathbb{R}^{n}$ that covers a set $U$ of finite measure. Then there exist finitely many disjoint balls $B_{1}, \ldots, B_{k}$ in $C$ such that the sum of the volume of these balls is greater than $3^{-n} a$, where $a$ is any number less than the measure of $U$.
(3) (a) State the definition of weak and strong convergence of sequences in a Banach space.
(b) Does weak convergence imply strong convergence? Explain why it does or does not.
(c) Show that every weakly convergent sequence in a Banach space is bounded with respect to the norm of the Banach space. (You may assume the uniform boundedness principle.)
(4) Prove that a linear functional $f$ on a normed vector space is bounded if and only if $f^{-1}(\{0\})$ is a closed subspace of $X$.
(5) Show that the Banach space $X=L^{1}[0,1]$ is not reflexive, namely $X$ is a proper subset of $X^{* *}$.

(1) Prove that every closed convex set in a Hilbert space has a unique element of minimal norm.

$$

(4) If $\psi \in C^{\infty}(\mathbb{R})$, show that

$$
\psi \delta^{(k)}=\sum_{j=0}^{k}(-1)^{j} \frac{k!}{j!(k-j)!} \psi^{(j)}(0) \delta^{(k-j)}
$$

where $\delta^{(k)}$ is the $k$-th derivative of delta function.
(5) Show that $L^{\infty}[0,1]$ is not separable, i.e., it does not have a countable dense subset.

(3) Prove or disprove this statement: if $X$ is a metric space then the $\sigma$ algebra of Borel subsets of $X$ is generated by the collection of closed balls in $X$.
(4) Prove or disprove this statement: the $\sigma$-algebra of Borel subsets of $\mathbb{R}$ is generated by intervals of the form $[a, a+1]$ for $a \in \mathbb{R}$.
(5) Prove or disprove this statement: if $f_{n}: \mathbb{R} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ are integrable functions with $f_{n} \rightarrow 0$ pointwise and

\lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} \int_{\mathbb{R}} f_{n} d x=0

(6) Prove or disprove this statement: if $f_{n}: \mathbb{R} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ are integrable functions such that $f_{n} \rightarrow 0$ in measure, then $f_{n} \rightarrow 0$ in $L^{1}$.

(1) Let $f(x):=\int_{0}^{+\infty} e^{-x t} t^{x} d t$, for $x>0$. Show that $f$ is well defined and $C^{1}$ (continuously differentiable) on $(0,+\infty)$, and compute its derivative.
(2) Let $p_{1}, p_{2}$ be such that $1 \leq p_{1} \leq p_{2}<\infty$ and let $f \in L^{P_{1}} \cap L^{P_{2}}$. Show that the map $p \mapsto\|f\|_{p}$ is well defined and continuous on $\left[p_{1}, p_{2}\right]$.
[Hint: first state and prove a suitable inequality involving $|f|^{p}$.]
(3) Show that the sequence of functions

$$
f_{n}(x):=\left(\frac{2}{\pi}\right)^{1 / 2} \cdot \sin (n x), \text { for } n=1,2,3, \ldots
$$

is an orthonormal basis of $L^{2}[0, \pi]$ but not of $L^{2}[0,2 \pi]$, even though it is an orthonormal sequence in $L^{2}[0,2 \pi]$.
(4) Prove that if $f:[0,+\infty) \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ is a continuous function tending to zero at infinity and such that

\int_{0}^{+\infty} f(x) e^{-n x} d x=0 \text { for } n=0,1,2, \ldots

then $f$ is the zero function.
(5) State the duality theorem for $L^{p}$ spaces and give a sketch of its proof when $1<p<\infty$. Briefly explain what happens when $p=1$ or $p=\infty$.

(2) Let $f_{n}$ be a sequence of measurable real valued functions on $\mathbb{R}$. Show that $A=\left\{x \in \mathbb{R} \mid \lim _{n \rightarrow \infty} f_{n}(x)\right.$ exists $\}$ is measurable.
(3) Let $f \in L^{1}(\mathbb{R}, d x)$ and $F(x)=\int_{-\infty}^{x} f(t) d t$. Show that $F(x)$ is uniformly continuous.
(4) Prove that the product of two measurable real valued functions on $\mathbb{R}$ is measurable. (Hint: show that if $f$ is measurable, then $f^{2}$ is measurable.)
(5) Evaluate $\int_{0}^{\infty} e^{-s x} x^{-1} \sin ^{2} x d x$ for $s>0$ by integrating $e^{-s x} \sin (2 x y)$ in a domain in $\mathbb{R}^{2}$. Exchange of iterated integrals needs to be justified.

(4) Let $f$ be integrable over $(-\infty, \infty)$ and $g \in L^{\infty}(-\infty, \infty)$. Prove:

\widehat{f^{\prime}}(k)=-2 \pi i k f(k)
$$

Note: passing derivatives through integrals needs to be rigorously justified.
(4) Prove that there exists a nonzero polynomial in $n$ variables, $P: \mathbb{R}^{n} \rightarrow$ $\mathbb{R}$, such that if $f: \mathbb{R}^{n} \rightarrow \mathbb{C}$ is measurable and

$$
|f(x)| \leq \frac{1}{P(x)}
$$

for all $x \in \mathbb{R}^{n}$, then $f \in L^{1}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$.
(5) Find a distribution $T$ on $\mathbb{R}$ whose Fourier transform is the Dirac delta supported at the number 2 . Rigorously prove that

$$
\widehat{T}(k)=\delta(k-2)
$$

(4) (a) Let $(X, \mathcal{A}, \mu)$ be a measure space. Let $\left(f_{n}\right)_{n \in \mathbb{N}}$ be a sequence of nonnegative measurable functions. Use the Monotone Convergence Theorem to prove that

$$
\int_{X}\left(\liminf _{n} f_{n}\right) d \mu \leq \liminf _{n} \int_{X} f_{n} d \mu

(b) Give an example of a sequence of nonnegative Borel measurable functions on the real line for which the inequality in Fatou's Lemma is strict - and prove that the inequality is strict.

In order to do this we define the family, $\mathcal{C}=\{A \in \mathcal{B}(\mathbb{R}): \forall \epsilon>0, \exists O$ open and $F$ closed for which $F \subseteq A \subseteq O$ and $\mu(O \backslash F) \leq \epsilon\}$.
(a) Show that $(a, b) \in \mathcal{C}$ for all $-\infty<a<b<+\infty$.
(b) Show that $\mathcal{C}$ is a $\sigma$-algebra.

Hint: The infinite union of closed set is not necessarily closed; however, you can remedy this problem by using the fact that a measure is continuous from above.
(c) Conclude from (a) and (b) that $\mu$ is regular.
(6) Let $f$ be a positive function in $L^{1} \cap L^{\infty}(X, \mathcal{M}, \mu)$ with $\|f\|_{L^{\infty}} \leq 1$, where $\mu$ is a finite measure. Show that

(iii) Lebesgue measure on $\mathbb{R}^{n}$.

13. Prove that for any set $E \subset[0,1]$ with positive Lebesgue outer measure (i.e., $m^{*}(E)>0$ ), there exists a subset of $E$ which is not measurable.

2. For every subset $M \subseteq \Re$ define $M+a=\{x+a: x \in M\}$.
(a) Let $E \subseteq \pi$ be a Borel set. Show that $E+a$ is also a Borel set.
(b) If $f: \Re \rightarrow \Re^{+}$is a Borel function and $g$ is defined as $g(x)=$ $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} f(x+n), x \in \Re$, show that $\int_{\Re} g(x) d \mu(x)<\infty$ iff $f=0$ $\mu$-almost everywhere, where $\mu$ is the Lebesgue measure on $\Re$. Give an example to show that "almost everwhere" cannot be omitted here.
3. Let $f(x, y)=e^{-x y^{2}} \cos x, 0 \leq x<\alpha, 0 \leq y<\infty$. Using the elementary result $\int_{0}^{\infty} e^{-\beta t^{2}} d t=\frac{1}{2} \sqrt{\frac{\pi}{\beta}}, \beta>0$, justify the steps and complete the following evaluation:
(a) $\int_{0}^{\alpha} \int_{0}^{\infty} f(x, y) d y d x=\int_{0}^{\infty} \int_{0}^{\alpha} f(x, y) d x d y, \alpha>0,(d x$ and $d y$ are Lebesgue measure).
(1) $\int_{0}^{\alpha} \int_{0}^{\infty} f(x, y) d y d x=\frac{\sqrt{\pi}}{2} \int_{0}^{\alpha} \frac{\cos x}{\sqrt{x}} d x$.
(c) Using integration by parts, show that $\int_{0}^{\alpha} f(x, y) d x=\frac{y^{2}}{1+y^{4}}\left(1-e^{-\alpha y^{2}} \cos \alpha\right)+$ $e^{-\alpha y^{2}} \frac{\sin \alpha}{1+y^{4}}$.
(d) $\lim _{\alpha \rightarrow 0} \int_{0}^{\infty} \int_{0}^{\alpha} f(x, y) d x d y=\int_{0}^{\infty} \frac{y^{2}}{1+y^{4}} d y=\frac{1}{4} \pi \sqrt{2}$ (You may use the elementary fact that $\int \frac{y^{2}}{1+y^{2}} d y=\frac{1}{8} \sqrt{2} \ln \frac{1-\sqrt{2} y+y^{2}}{1+\sqrt{2} y+y^{2}}+\frac{1}{4} \sqrt{2} \arctan (\sqrt{2} y+1)+$ $\left.\frac{1}{4} \sqrt{2} \arctan (\sqrt{2} y-1)+C\right)$.
(e) Deduce that $\int_{0}^{\infty} \frac{\cos x}{\sqrt{x}} d x=\frac{1}{2} \sqrt{2} \sqrt{\pi}$, even though $\frac{\cos x}{\sqrt{x}}$ is not Lebesgue integrable on $\Re^{+}$.
4. Give an example of a Lebesgue integrable function that is not Riemann integrable. Work out the details!
5. A function $f$ is said to satisfy a Lipschitz condition on an interval $[a, b]$, if there is a constant $M$ such that $|f(x)-f(y)| \leq M|x-y|$ for all $x, y \in$ $[a, b]$.
(a) Show that a function satisfying a Lipschitz condition is absolutely continuous.
(b) Show that an absolutely continuous function $f$ satisfies a Lipschitz condition if and only if $\left|f^{\prime}\right|$ is bounded.
(c) Prove or give a counterexample: $f$ satisfies a Lipschitz condition if one of its derivatives (say $D^{+}$) is bounded.
6. Let $\ell^{\infty}$ be the space of all bounded sequences of real numbers. For $\left(\xi_{n}\right)_{n \geq 1}$ define

Which of the following statements is true? Prove your answers!
(a) The closure of $S$ is compact in $L^{\infty}(\mathbf{R})$ with its norm topology.
(b) $S$ is closed in the $L^{\infty}(\mathbf{R})$ with its norm topology.
(c) The closure of $S$ in the weak** topology is compact in that topology. (Hint: recall that $L^{\infty}(\mathbf{R})=L^{1}(\mathbf{R})^{*}$.)
8. State and prove the Radon-Nikodym theorem.
9. Prove the Lebesgue Decomposition Theorem: if $\mu$ and $\nu$ are $\sigma$-finite measures on the measurable space $(X, \mathcal{A}, \mu)$, then we can find measures $\nu_{0}, \nu_{1}$ with $\nu=\nu_{0}+\nu_{1}, \nu_{0} \perp \mu$, and $\nu_{1} \ll \mu$. Please do 3 problems from Group I, 4 problems from Group II, and 3 problems from Group III. (Each problem is weighted equally. No extra-credit will be given for any additional problem attempted beyond these 10 problems.) Please always justify your answers. Also, please indicate at the beginning of the text which problems you have selected in each group. Good luck!

## GROUP I

1. (a) Give the definition of a connected set in Euclidean space $\mathbb{R}^{n}$.
(b) Show that if $C \subset \mathbb{R}^{n}$ is connected, then any continuous function $f: C \rightarrow \mathbb{Z}$ is constant. (Here, $\mathbb{Z}=\{0, \pm 1, \pm 2, \cdots\}$ denotes the set of integers.) Is the converse true?
2. (a) Let $f(x)=\|x\|$, for $x \in \mathbb{R}^{n}$, where $\|x\|=\left(\sum_{k=1}^{n} x_{k}^{2}\right)^{1 / 2}$ denotes the Euclidean length of $x=\left(x_{1}, \ldots, x_{n}\right) \in \mathbb{R}^{n}$. Compute $f^{\prime}(x)$, the differential of $f$ at $x$, whenever it exists. If $f^{\prime}(x)$ does not exist for some $x$, explain why.
(b) Answer the same questions as in (a) for the function $f(x)=\|x\|^{2}$, for $x \in \mathbb{R}^{n}$.
3. Let $\zeta(x)=\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} n^{-x}$, for $x>1$.
(a) Show that this series of functions is uniformly convergent on $(a,+\infty)$, for every $a>1$.
(b) Show that $\zeta$ is continuous on $(1,+\infty)$.
4. (a) Give an example of a sequence of real-valued functions $\left\{f_{n}\right\}$ which converges pointwise but not uniformly on $[0,1]$.
(b) Give an example of a series of differentiable functions $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} f_{n}$ which converges uniformly on $[0,1]$ but such that there exists $x_{0}$ in $[0,1]$ at which the series of derivatives $\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} f_{n}^{\prime}\left(x_{0}\right)$ does not converge.
5. (a) State (without proof) the Stone-Weierstrass Theorem (for real-valued functions).
(b) Show that the algebra (of real-valued functions) generated by the set $\left\{1, x^{2}\right\}$ is dense in $C[0,1]$ but is not dense in $C[-1,1]$. (Here, $C(I)$ denotes the space of real-valued continuous functions on $I$ and is equipped with the topology of uniform convergence.)

## GROUP II

6. Let $E$ be a Banach space and let $L(E)$ denote the space of bounded linear operators from $E$ to itself, equipped with its usual norm. Show that $L(E)$ is a Banach space (that is, show that $L(E)$ is complete for its natural metric).
7. Show that

$$
F(t)=\int_{-\infty}^{\infty} \frac{\sin \left(x^{2} t\right)}{1+x^{2}} d x
$$

is well-defined and continuous on $\mathbb{R}$.
8. Show that every nondecreasing function $f: \mathbb{R} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ is Borel measurable.
9. Let $(X, \mathcal{A}, \mu)$ be a measure space and $f: X \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ be a measurable function. Let $\theta \in[0,1]$ and $p, q, s$ be three strictly positive numbers such that $\frac{1}{s}=\frac{\theta}{p}+\frac{1-\theta}{q}$.
Show that

$$
\|f\|_{s} \leq\|f\|_{p}^{\theta}\|f\|_{q}^{1-\theta}
$$

(Here, for example, $\|f\|_{p}$ denotes the $L^{p}$-norm of $f$.)
Please note: You are allowed to use a well-known inequality.
10. Show that the normed space $L^{2}[0,1]$ is separable but that $L^{\infty}[0,1]$ is not.
(Recall that a metric space is separable if it contains a dense and at most countable subset. Further, here, for example, $L^{2}[0,1]$ is equipped with Lebesgue measure on $[0,1]$.)
11. Show that any Borel measure $\mu$ on $\mathbb{R}$ which is translation invariant and such that $\mu([0,1])=1$ must coincide with Lebesgue measure on $\mathbb{R}$.
(Recall that $\mu$ is translation invariant if $\mu(a+B)=\mu(B)$, for every $a \in \mathbb{R}$ and Borel set $B \subset \mathbb{R}$, where $a+B=\{a+x: x \in B\}$.)
12. Let $(E,\|\cdot\|)$ be a normed linear space and let $T: E \rightarrow E$ be a linear map. Show that the following statements are equivalent:
(i) $T$ is continuous.
(ii) $T$ is continuous at 0 .
(iii) $T$ is bounded; i.e., there exists $C>0$ such that

$$
\|T x\| \leq C\|x\|, \quad \text { for all } x \in E
$$

13. State precisely and sketch the proof of the Baire Category Theorem.
14. State precisely and sketch the proof of the Hahn-Banach Theorem.
15. State precisely Lebesgue's Dominated Convergence Theorem (but do not sketch its proof). Give an example showing that if the dominating condition is not satisfied, then the conclusion of the theorem does not hold.
16. Given $1 \leq p<\infty$, show that $L^{P}(\mathbb{R})$, equipped with its usual metric (and with Lebesgue measure), is complete.
17. Let $H$ be a real Hilbert space. Show that its dual $H^{\prime}$ is isomorphic to $H$. (Here, $H^{\prime}$ denotes the space of continuous linear functionals on $H$.)
[Advice: Justify precisely your answer.]
18. (a) State (without proof) the Closed Graph Theorem and the Open Mapping Theorem.
(b) Assuming the Open Mapping Theorem, deduce the Closed Graph Theorem.

3. Describe the Cantor (ternary) set $C$ via "removing middle thirds" and show that $C$ is uncountable and has measure 0 .
4. Prove or disprove the following statement:

A real-valued continuous function on the interval $[0,1]$ that is differentiable with derivative $=0$ everywhere except on a set of (one-dimensional) measure zero is necessarily constant.
5. Given a Banach space $X$, denote by $\mathcal{L}(X)$ the space of bounded linear operators from $X$ to itself, equipped with its usual norm, and let $G$ denote the set of invertible elements in $\mathcal{L}(X)$.
(a) Show that if $A \in \mathcal{L}(X)$ and $\|A\|<1$, then $I-A \in G$; further, compute $(I-A)^{-1}$.
(b) Show that $G$ is an open subset of $\mathcal{L}(X)$ and that the map $\phi: G \rightarrow G$ defined by $\phi(Q)=Q^{-1}$ is continuous.
6. Sketch the proof of the Hahn-Banach Theorem. [Advice: You should explain the basic steps involved in the proof, but you do not need to provide every technical detail.]
7. State and prove the Baire Category Theorem. Moreover, give at least one significant application of this theorem in real or in functional analysis.
8. If $\left\{f_{n}\right\}$ is a sequence of pointwise bounded functions on $[a, b]$, show that there exists a subsequence of $\left\{f_{n}\right\}$ which converges on a dense subset of $[a, b]$. (Assume that the functions are $\mathbb{R}^{k}$-valued.)
9. Let $X$ be any compact subset of $\mathbb{R}$ containing an interval (of positive length). Is it possible that $\{f \in C(X):|f(x)| \leq 1, \forall x \in X\}$ is a compact subset of $C(X)$ ? Prove your assertion.
10. State Fatou's Lemma. Prove the Lebesgue Dominated Convergence Theorem using Fatou's Lemma.
11. State the Fundamental Theorem of Calculus (FTOC) (relating a function $F$ to the integral of its derivative) in its most general form, stating the necessary and sufficient condition (C) that $F$ must satisfy in order that the theorem hold. Finally, consider $F(x)=|x|$ on $\mathbb{R}$. Illustrate the truth or falsity of the FTOC in this case; i.e., show that $F(x)$ either does or does not satisfy C and also that $F(x)$ does or does not satisfy the statement of the FTOC.
12. Let $L^{1}$ be the Banach space of Lebesgue integrable functions on $[0,1]$. Let $F$ be a bounded linear functional on $L^{1}$. Prove that there is a bounded measurable function $g$ so that $F(f)=\int_{0}^{1} f(x) g(x) d x, f \in L^{1}$. (You may use properties of absolutely continuous functions, density of step functions, etc. You may NOT use the fact that the dual space of $L^{1}$ is $L^{\infty}$.)
13. Let $f: \mathbb{R}^{n} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ be a differentiable function that is homogeneous of order $k$ (i.e., $\left.f\left(\lambda x_{1}, \ldots, \lambda x_{n}\right)=\lambda^{k} f\left(x_{1}, \ldots, x_{n}\right), \forall \lambda \in \mathbb{R}\right)$. Show that $x_{1} \frac{\partial f}{\partial x_{1}}+\cdots+x_{n} \frac{\partial f}{\partial x_{n}}=k f$ (i.e., $\vec{x} \cdot f^{\prime}(\vec{x})=k f(\vec{x})$ ).
14. Let $f: \mathbb{R}^{n} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ be a differentable function. Define the directional derivative of $f$ (at $\vec{x}$ ) in the direction of the unit vector $\vec{v} \in \mathbb{R}^{n}$. Show that this derivative has maximum modulus when $v$ is in the direction of the gradient $\left(f^{\prime}\right)$ of $f$.
15. Let $f(x)$ be a continuous function from $[a, b]$ into itself.
(a) Prove from basic principles that $f\left(x_{0}\right)=x_{0}$ for some $x_{0} \in[a, b]$.
(b) Assume in addition that the derivative $f^{\prime}$ exists on $(a, b)$ and that $\left|f^{\prime}(x)\right| \leq \alpha$, for some $0<\alpha<1$. Prove that the fixed point $x_{0}$ is unique and state and prove an algorithm for finding $x_{0}$.

6. Show that the series $S_{1}=\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} n q^{n}$ and $S_{2}=\sum_{n=1}^{\infty} n^{2} q^{n}$ are uniformly convergent for $0<q<1$. Show that $S_{1}=q(1-q)^{-2}$. Using this find a similar expression for $S_{2}$. compacicuterion
7. Let $X$ be a compact subset of $\mathbf{R}$ containing an interval of positive length.Is it possible that $\{f \in C(X)||f(x)| \leq 1$, for all $x \in X\}$ is a compact subset of $C(X)$ ? Prove your assertion. Here $C(X)$ is the space of continuous functions on $X$.

## Real Analysis Qualifying Exam

Note: Part A is advanced calculus, and students should attempt three questions from this part.

3. State the Inverse Function Theorem for functions from $\mathbf{R}^{n}$ into $\mathbf{R}^{n}$. What conclusion can be drawn from this theorem about the function $f(x, y)=$ $\left(x+y, x^{2}-y\right)$ near the point $(0,0)$ in $\mathbf{R}^{2}$ ?
4. Prove or give a counterexample: the set $\mathbf{R}$ of real numbers with its usual topology is a union of nowhere dense subsets.
5. Prove that if $X$ and $Y$ are topological spaces, $f: X \rightarrow Y$ is continuous, and $K \subseteq X$ is compact, then $f(K) \subseteq Y$ is compact.
